The Popov Gold Medal was instituted by a Decree of the Soviet Government dated 2nd May 1945, and one medal is awarded annually on May 7th by the Academy of Sciences of the USSR to a Soviet or foreign scientist for outstanding scientific research or invention in the field of radio.

The conditions governing the award of the Popov Medal were approved by the Soviet Government on 24th February 1946.

In view of the fact that, according to the conditions for award, the first Popov Medal will be awarded in 1946, the ~~All-Union Radio~~ *Academy of Sciences of the USSR* ~~Physics and Radio Engineering Council~~ requests that works intending to compete for the Popov Medal be sent to the Academy of Sciences of the USSR, Moscow, by October 1st, 1946. They should be marked: Radio Council. Popov Medal Competition.

We shall be greatly obliged if you will publish the conditions for the Popov Medal competition in your Journal,

CONDITIONS

FOR THE AWARD OF THE "POPOV" MEDAL

1. Beginning with 1946 the Popov Medal for outstanding research and invention in the field of radio is awarded annually by the Presidium of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR on the USSR on the recommendation of its Radio Physics and Radio Engineering Council.

2. The Radio Physics and Radio Engineering Council will examine and judge all works presented in competition for the Popov Medal.

3. The Popov Medal is awarded for original works of major importance to the development of radio. The first award of the Medal will be made for a work completed between 1935 and 1945 and subsequently for works completed between competitors.

4. Works submitted for the Popov Medal Competition are to reach the Academy of Sciences Radio Physics and Radio Engineering Council not later than 1st February of the year for which the Medal is awarded: they must be marked "Popov Medal Competition".

The Council is obliged to examine the works and submit the names of candidates for the award of the Popov Medal to the Presidium of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR not later than 7th April of the same year.

The Presidium of the Academy will award the Popov Medal on 7th May ("Radio Day") each year.

5. The Popov Medal may be awarded to Soviet or foreign scientists for works that have already been published.

The works may be submitted by scientific bodies, research institutions, higher educational establishments, government bodies, public bodies and individuals.

6. The works may be submitted in any language, in three copies, typed or printed. Organisations submitting works for the Medal competition should append their estimate of the scientific value of the work and its significance to the development of radio, a short biography of the candidate and a list of his major scientific papers and inventions.

19. If the Radio Physics and Radio Engineering Council of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR is of the opinion that none of the works submitted are worthy of the Medal the competition is declared null and void.
